

GLIMPSE OF SPRING TO COME



SOLVING a LONG TERM FLOODING PROBLEM

For many years WCHS has had a serious water problem between the culvert under Highway 92 and our lower level entrance that takes you into the Warren County Model Railroader's exhibit. The culvert under the highway is too small to remove the water that pools like a pond from a heavy rain of 3 or 4 inches and our slope is only 3 3/4". Every time we have a heavy rain we get water in our basement. All of us know what damage this can do in a museum.

Mike Vanderpool has placed his attention of how this problem might be solved. He has put in a new roof drain, rerouted a sump line, removed old pipe, excavated a flume and brought in gravel. Rob and Mark Ricketts of Cambron & Thatcher have poured cement for a flume to the culvert. See photo below.

We thank Mike, Rob and Mark for taking on this project. Mike will do a little more grading and reseed the area. He reminded us that this may not totally eliminate the problem but is a great improvement. We are all waiting for the test by a heavy rain.

When you see Mike, Rob or Mark thank them for helping us solve a long term problem.

Roy Lewis Igo caricature from April 18, 1918 Advocate Tribune. Roy Lewis Igo was born in Palmyra to Lewis Igo III (Indianola Mayor) and Elizabeth M. (Varner) Igo. He died in California July 12, 1950. Roy had garages in Indianola, Osceola and Earlham. For judging stock at the Iowa State Fair he won a scholarship for two years to Iowa State. He was an engineer and machinist. Roy was also a contractor that straightened the Chariton River in Macon County, Mo and straightened Grand River near Pattonsburg, MS.

Several years ago, it was noticed that there were a number of African Americans living in rural Otter Township in the early 1900s. After years of wondering why they lived in a rural township instead of town, the answer was found in Don Berry's writings. He was an Indianola newspaper publisher and photographer.

According to Berry, the Henry Hall family lived a short distance east of Hammondsburg (one of Warren County's abandoned communities) in Otter Township. The large family would travel to the Warren County Fair in a lumber wagon. The family was well liked. One son married a Caucasian woman and moved to Canada.

Later the family moved to Indianola and lived on South Jefferson (State Street then). Ed McKee remembered that Mrs. Hall had a standing invitation to neighborhood boys to visit for sugar cookies.

Harry Weinman had a photo of the Indianola Brass Band of about 1908 in which Ed and Harrison Hall played. Both later traveled with Ringling Brother Barnum & Bailey Circus. Ed played in one sideshow band, but Harrison played baritone or bass in the main circus band. Weinman talked to them one time when the circus was in Des Moines and Harrison said he had been with the band over 20 years. Later Berry heard that Harrison had lost his job when the band joined a union, since the union would not admit African Americans as members.



Rev. A.D. Field, George Washington Carver's Friend

Alvaro Dickenson Field was born in Bristol, Ontario County, NY, October 22, 1827. His parents were John and Charity (Damon) Field. His wife was Margaret Jane Nunamaker, daughter of John Nicholas and Catherine Ann (Roberts) Nunamaker.

In 1835 the John Field family moved to Chicago, IL and then to Kane County, IL. In 1942 A.D. Field was converted at meetings in Elgin held by the Methodists for young people. He joined the Clark Street Methodist Church and helped with Sabboth School. In 1846 he decided to prepare for the ministry and attended Mount Morris Methodist Seminary. In 1948 he began to preach in the Rock River Methodist Conference. He then served as a circuit rider and in many churches.

In 1871 Field and wife Maggie moved to a small farm near Indianola north of Simpson College and in the Mount Hope School area. Field had to retire from the ministry and public speaking because of health issues related to his throat. Here he operated a nursery and orchard.

March 28, 1874 A.D Field organized Sunday School at the Spring Hill Methodist Church. In July Greenbush and Mount Hope schoolhouse united with the Spring Hill Church. The first organist was A.D. Field, who had a portable organ which he brought to services in a buckboard sort of spring wagon. Without songbooks at first, singing was a big part of the Sunday School. Field was superintendent of the Spring Hill Sunday School for 7 years and then taught Sunday School at the Indianola First Methodist Church.

In 1876 he published a volume, Memorials of Methodism and then one called, Worthies & Workers of the Rock River Conference.

On his orchard he raised grapes, raspberries and other fruit plants to sell. One ad in the **Indianola Herald** said that Field had 100 ten foot ornamental trees for sale in his nursery.

A.D. Field also was very involved at Simpson College. In his will he left some land to Simpson. Carver and Field shared their interests in raising and studying plants, music, Simpson College and religion. It is no wonder that they became friends while Carver was in Indianola.

The January 11, 1896 **Indianola Herald** stated that the teachers and officers of the 1st Methodist Church Sunday School had a surprise Christmas event honoring A.D. and his wife Maggie. W.H. Berry made the presentation of a new rocking chair to A.D. Field and presented to Maggie a painting of A.D. that had been painted by Sofia Liston, wife of William A. Liston. Sofia was an art student with G.W. Carver and a close friend. The Listons operated a bookstore on the Indianola Square.

A.D. Field died December 15, 1908 and is buried in the Indianola Odd Fellows Cemetery.
